

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Galerie BAO is pleased to present *Blue Filaments*, **Lêna Bùi**'s first solo show in Paris. The eponym exhibition refers to her current ongoing project revolving around "felled trees and recurring dreams, ancestral wisdom and haunting"¹.

This project explores memories, materiality and human beliefs as well as the relationship one has with its surroundings.² It all started when Ho Chi Minh City announced that the city would cut down hundreds of trees for urban development purposes. These trees were *Khaya Senegalensis*, a species native to West Africa and brought to Vietnam by the French during colonization. Shown for the first time in France, this project opens the reflection around the colonial legacy inside the colonial network or in what it is left of. The paradox between the colonial legacy and the environmental issue is revealed in this project. These trees shaped the city, taking part in the city-dwellers' life but surprisingly, the cutting down of the trees was announced in indifference.

The project consists of a performance in 2018 on Tôn Đức Thắng street where 143 *Khaya Senegalensis* ranging from 100 to 150 years old were chopped down. Every day for a month Lêna came and made tracing of the left behind stumps.



In Vietnam, and in Southeast Asia at large, the trees are part of the spiritual world. Considered as sacred, they house spirits. With this project, the artist wonders where the souls go when the trees are cut down. Opposed to the cartesian philosophy where the humans are above nature, the artist thinks humans have intricate relationships with their surroundings, even with the spiritual world.

On the gallery's window a 1:1 transparent vinyl print version of a rubbing casts shadows as the light enters in the gallery, revealing details of the rubbings, and as the light makes its way through the day, details of the chainsaw marks on the ground

soften, symbolizing the violence the trees went through. The use of the natural light combined with the olfactory experience brought by the collaboration between Lêna Bùi and Dex Lê³, a saigon-based olfactory artist and designer, questions the relationship people have with their environment but also highlights the elusive and ephemeral nature of life.

Downstairs, the video installation *Kindred* made by Lêna Bùi and Elisabeth Ang is a visual poem playing with our senses. Sounds of nature, languages and images taken from multiple place and period of time⁴ act in harmony. Lêna's works balance amid still and moving images, in the video as well as with the contrast between the moving shadows of the vinyl and the silk paintings upstairs. The latter are themselves multi-layered images, embodying the idea of flows of energy around and within our human bodies.

"If the body is an ecosystem of sorts then why not the soul? If we die and disperse into all sorts of nutrients that are absorbed by other living things, then maybe our souls, too, split into small parts that get reconfigured into new souls."⁵

In her ongoing layered silk painting series on the ground floor of the gallery, Lêna Bùi delves into the entanglements that make us human beings. The series consists of paintings in silk with superimposed printed or painted images. "This juxtaposition of organic life, spiritual presence, and circular flows evokes an assemblage of seemingly unrelated concepts—ecology, reincarnation, ancestral presence, and ensouled nature—and finds the proverbial middle path where they all overlap and converge."⁶

Getting inspired by Taoism,

animism, philosophy, science and Buddhism precepts, Lêna Bùi does not take dogma for granted, trusting her observation of her surroundings. Painting is a way of seeing, observing to the point of reaching the abstract forms of nature. Her creative process is also a way for her to connect to her subconscious, digging into emotions, memories, instincts. She paints to remember.

Her work has been shown in solo, group exhibitions and screening programmes such as Delfina Foundation, London; Monograph 2023 by Asian Film Archive; 2022 Jeju Biennale, the Asia Culture Center, South Korea; Sharjah Art Foundation, UAE; Sàn Art and The Factory Contemporary Art Center, Vietnam; Haus der Kulturen der Welt, Germany; and the Wellcome Collection, London.
